Eventually supper is cooked, served and eaten, the washing up is done; the kitchen floor is swept and mopped and we head to the chapel for night prayer.

As I sit in the semi darkness of the chapel I give thanks for being able to be a volunteer here: for the way that worship and work is all so obviously part of the same thing, for the people that allow me to "belong" even if only for a day or a week, and for the fact that I can - and will - come again; please God.
